BUILT ON LEGACY, DRIVEN BY PASSION

CLINT CURRIE RETURNS TO CSS AS HEAD COACH OF STORM FOOTBALL

In 1964, Jack Covey, with the help of the now-defunct Chilliwack Mustangs Jr. Football Club's gear, founded the CSS Football Team. The team achieved remarkable success from the start, winning the Fraser Valley championship. Among the players was a determined 14-year-old named Keith Currie, who would rise to become the defensive captain. His passion for the game led him to join the UBC Thunderbirds.

Fast forward to 1990, when Keith's 11-year-old son, Clint, discovered his passion for football, joining a local flag football team due to the absence of tackle options in Chilliwack. One day, while walking through the 7 Oaks mall, he found a sign-up booth for Langley Minor Football, igniting his lifelong commitment to the sport. Despite his reluctance to drive to Langley, Keith saw the fire in his son's eyes and decided to coach Clint on the 1991 Langley Broncos Jr. Bantam team.

Determined to create opportunities closer to home, Keith and a small group of dedicated parents established a football club in Chilliwack, BC. With Keith's resourcefulness and his wife's fundraising talents, the Chilliwack Greyhaws took the field for the first time in 1992. By 1997, Clint had become captain of one of the most successful teams in Chilliwack's history, winning the first Fraser Valley Championship in 25 years. Clint's journey continued as he excelled in Jr. and university football, culminating in a National Championship at the University of Ottawa. Keith's two younger sons also embraced the sport.

Keith went on to become the founding president of the Valley Huskers Jr. Football Club. Now, Clint inspires the next generation, coaching Keith's grandson, Connor, who eagerly looks forward to playing for CSS in its revival during the 2026-2027 season.
